ADVICE FROM THE CLASS OF 2021

General advice for the Medicine clerkship:

Ask chiefs to practice presentations.

Read up on patient presentations and management regularly. Questions are not enough!

There is a lot to cover during this clerkship, so be sure to study every day. You must make being part of your team a priority, but during down time chip away at readings and reviews.

Whenever possible, attend the resident teaching sessions (noon conference, morning report, intern report) - they help to reinforce the content you're studying and learning from your patients.

Choose a few resources that work best for you and stick with them. The Pocket book is helpful for patient presentations (real and ACE rounds) and for write ups. Uworld questions and Step Up To Medicine are great for shelf prep.






